PSALM 88
DEALING WITH DARKNESS
Psalm 88:1-18

MAIN IDEA: Great suffering requires great compassion.

Canon: God recognizes your suffering.

Cross: God subjects Himself to your suffering.

Compassion: God suffers with you.

DISCUSSION & REFLECTION QUESTIONS

- What stood out most to you from this sermon? What does God want you to do in response?
- What are you most likely to do when you experience suffering? Does it lead you to God or away from Him?
- What does this psalm reveal to you about what God thinks of your suffering?
- If you are suffering, who do you need to reach out to? Who in your life might need you to be a friend in the midst of their suffering?
